- 1. The **Henry Sweet Lecture 2007** will be delivered by **Hans Kamp** (University of Stuttgart) on the evening of 29th August, with the title 'Discourse Linking as (Simultaneous) Constraint Solving'
- 2. The Linguistics Association Lecture 2007 will be delivered by **B. Elan Dresher** (University of Toronto) on 1st September, with the title 'The Contrastive Hierarchy in Phonology'.
- 3. A **workshop** on **Issues in Dynamic Semantics**, related to the Henry Sweet Lecture and organised by Martina Faller (Manchester) and Shalom Lappin (KCL), will be held on the afternoon of 29th August, featuring Chris Fox, Jonathan Ginzburg, Ruth Kempson, Shalom Lappin, and Alex Lascarides.
- 4. A special **themed session**, related to the Linguistics Association Lecture, with the title '**Contrast in Phonology**', will be held on 1st September.
- 5. There will be a Language Tutorial on Slavey, given by Keren Rice (University of Toronto).
- 6. There will be a session organised by the LAGB's **Education Committee** which will feature a discussion of how linguists in Higher Education communicate with teachers and pupils in schools. There will also be a talk, sponsored by the UK Subject Centre for Languages, Linguistics and Area Studies, on the transition from English Language 'A' Level to the study of Linguistics and English Language in Higher Education.

Venue

London is one of the oldest and most vibrant cities in the world. A short walk in any direction affords glimpses of Roman, Medieval, Tudor, Georgian, or Victorian London. The city is dense with museums, galleries, theatres, pubs, and shopping districts, and its mosaic cultural heritage has contributed innumerable cuisines, from afternoon tea at the Ritz to curry festivals in Brick Lane.

King's College London hosts a vibrant community of over 25 linguists in several departments. The conference venue (Waterloo Campus) is situated at the heart of the city on the south bank of the river Thames, beside the famous South Bank Centre (host to the Royal Festival Hall, National Theatre, Hayward Gallery and much more) and a short walk across the river from Covent Garden, Trafalgar Square, and the West End theatre district.

Accommodation is provided in the immediate vicinity of the conference venue – see the booking website and conference website for details.

Travel: London has five airports and fast train connections within Europe. The London Underground train network and an extensive bus network provide transport within the city. Heathrow, Stansted, and Gatwick airports all have express train connections to London Underground stations. Waterloo Station (with local Underground and international Eurostar train links) is two minutes' walk from the conference site. - (b) individual items: conference fee (obligatory) = \$55.00, bed and breakfast = \$35 per night, lunch = \$8.00 per meal, dinner = \$12.00 per meal

Booking deadline: There is a discount on bookings received by **1st August 2007**, expressed as a 'late fee' for bookings received after that date.

Guests and non-members: Members may invite any number of guests to meetings of the Association, and non-members may attend without invitation; an additional guest fee of £5.00 is payable on booking for non-members, in addition to the standard fees. This can be avoided by joining the Association before booking.
